INCLEMENT WEATHER

Our meetings follow the Prince George's Public Schools' policy for cancellation due to inclement weather. Listen to your radio and/or TV for announcements. However, a delayed opening means that our meeting will be held as scheduled.

LEGISLATIVE REPORT

The Maryland General Assembly convenes on January 9, 2013. There is only one specific issue that we are supporting "Fiscal Cliff". Governor O'Malley must submit a at this time, and that is changing the Maryland State Retirement and Pension System (MSRPS) funding from the Corridor method back to the Actuarial method. The state began using the Corridor method of funding during the Glendening administration, where-by they put in a reduced amount of money than had been determined to fund the system at an 80% level. Each year since, the state has continued this method of funding, reducing the System to about a 60% level. Under the Actuarial funding method, a specific predetermined amount of money would be required to be added to MSRPS each year.

The state is still responsible for our retiree/pension benefits. The counties are now partially responsible for active teacher benefits. Within four years the counties will be totally responsible for the current teacher retiree pensions.

We must remain on guard, though, to protect our health care 19th. benefits, as the state does not provide those.

The Maryland Budget & Taxation Institute reported at the end of November that Maryland's budget is on an impressive the group, as we will be representing all county school recovery tract. In 2007, a recession hit in the United States, causing a drastic drop in the economy. Maryland lost almost Forestville at 8:45 a.m. and travelling by coach bus to 200,000 jobs, but we have gained back about two thirds of those. Our state's economy is recovering due to restraint in spending, transfers of money, and increased revenue brought rooms and chambers of the Maryland State House, and in by the one-cent increase in sales tax, along with the increase in the tax on liquor and tobacco, and slot machine revenue (about \$200 million this year).



Maryland has protected funding for Medicare, Medicaid, and education. The state's 5% "Rainy Day Fund" remains untouched. The economy continues to recover - - - but (as of this December printing) we do not know what is going to happen with the Federal budget for 2014 on January 16, 2013. His staff is planning a "contingency budget" in the event that the Federal government does not prevent the "Fiscal Cliff".

On November 26th AARP reported that Maryland was awarded \$123 million of Federal funding to help start the official launch of Maryland's health **Insurance Exchange under the Affordable Health** Care Act. This program will help thousands of uninsured Marylanders buy health insurance coverage that will become effective January 1, 2014. Maryland is working aggressively to expand access to affordable health care for all of our citizens.

The Social Security Administration has announced that monthly Social Security and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) benefits for nearly 62 million Americans will increase 1.7% in 2013.

The 1.7% cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) will begin with benefits that more than 56 million Social Security beneficiaries receive in January 2013. Increased payments to more than 8 million SSI beneficiaries will begin on December

Some other changes that take effect in January of each year are based on the increase in average wages. Based on that increase, the maximum amount of earnings subject to the Social Security tax (taxable maximum) will increase to \$113,700 from \$110,100. Of the 163 million workers who will pay Social Security taxes in 2013, nearly 10 million will pay higher taxes as a result of the increase in the taxable maximum.
