
You may contact Don if you ever have an occasion for such a display.

# PGPSRA LEGISLATIVE REPORT

On January 9, 2013, the opening day of the Maryland General Assembly, Senate President Thomas V. Mike Miller, Jr. was re-elected to serve for the 27th straight year, while House Speaker Michael Bush was reelected for his 11<sup>th</sup> term. As the Session gets underway, members will be facing several new issues and revisiting old as well. Gun control with close attention to a ban on assault rifles will be addressed as well as a third drive to provide incentives to jump start the state's wind power industry. Repeal of the death penalty and a possible gas tax increase to add to the state transportation budget may also be active issues.

As your PGPSRA Legislative Chairs, we (Sue and Jannette) have passed out letters to each of our Prince George's legislators letting them know of our organization and our concern about dropping Corridor funding in favor of Actuarial funding of the retirement/pension system. We also attend the Prince George's Delegation meetings in Annapolis each Friday morning to learn more about our county's advantages and problems.

For the fifth year in a row, Maryland's public school system took the top ranking in the nation conducted by EDUCATION WEEK, a non-profit publication's study that annually examines state education policies and student achievement across all 50 states and the District of Columbia. Maryland was the only state to earn a grade of B+. Massachusetts, New York, and Virginia followed immediately behind with a grade of B. Maryland received high marks for its investment in early childhood and policies related to college and workforce readiness. Governor O'Malley noted that Maryland also boasts the highest median household

income in the nation and has one of the most educated workforces in the country.

The annual United Seniors of Maryland Forum will be held at St. Johns College in Annapolis on Tuesday, March 19, 2013. This is always an interesting all day meeting with invited speakers: Governor O'Malley, Senate President Miller, House Speaker Busch, Secretary of Aging Lawlah, and from Social Security someone the Administration.
