PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

The PGCRTA Executive Committee met in early February to finalize the 2002/2003 Budget that will be acted upon at the General Membership Meeting in March. As the budget development process began in January, an Ad Hoc Committee that had been appointed by the president took considerable time to review the Association's budgetary priorities that have become the norm during the past five years. The committee also accepted the challenge to attempt to project our financial requirements over the next several years, and recommend an annual dues amount that could enable us to meet the goals of the Association.

It was indeed a lively process that resulted in a set of recommendations for the Executive Committee and the membership to consider. Some of them simply recommend minor changes in the way the line-up items are organized in the budget, while others focus on several topics that should receive increased attention. One example highlights the expanding difficulty we are having in distributing ECHOES, especially with the bulk mailing dilemma. On this topic, the recommendations call for the Association to explore the feasibility of contracting with a distribution service, and to seek a way that the address and label files can be professionally maintained.

Another recommended priority centers around various ways that we can assist needy students within the Prince George's School System. The hope here is that in the years ahead we will be able to expand the amount that is set aside for the scholarships for county graduates who plan to enter the field of education, and to investigate possible ways that individual members of the Association could make an additional donation to the scholarship fund if they so choose. Included within this priority is the strong feeling that we should also increase donations to worthwhile causes within Prince George's community.

Other recommendations included such topics as

programs for the General Membership meetings, the Executive Committee stipends for the MRTA Annual Convention, delegates to the MRTA Annual Business Meeting, and the PGCRTA Telephone Tree. And it was also recommended that we attempt to maintain the current PGCRTA annual membership fee of \$10.00 for the foreseeable future.

The Executive Committee favorably received the recommendations of the Ad Hoc Committee at its meeting in February, and extended a vote of thanks for the work that had been done. While they generally agreed with the series of priorities that had been recommended, the committee quickly began to realize that the Association is not currently in a position to fully fund everything at this time. However, as the budget was being worked on, they did attempt to shift monies to move toward improving the difficulties that surround ECHOES, strengthening the programs for membership meetings, and some increased assistance for students. And then voted to use the remaining recommendations as potential goals for future planning.



LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

The Maryland General Assembly convened in Annapolis on January 9, 2002, and the 90 day session will end on April 8th. Several interesting legislative developments have occurred so far during this session.

Of considerable concern to us as retirees, is the fact that Governor Glendening did NOT budget \$65 million of the state's portion of money into the retirement pension fund this year. True, we are fully funded for the next ten years, but eliminating this year's state portion could set a precedent we do not like to see.

Governor Glendening has asked the legislature to delay the promised tax cut for this year. Meanwhile, the General Assembly approved "full market value" tax assessments for Prince George's County, which means property owners are experiencing a significant immediate increase in taxes.


Hearings are continuing to be held in Annapolis on the merging of CareFirst (Blue Cross/Blue Shield's largest health insurer that covers most Maryland residents) with Well Point (of California). The merger would allow CareFirst to become a for-profit company, with main offices located in California. This would have a significant impact on Maryland residents, with raising of fees and making the filing of disputed claims more difficult.

MRTA's Legislative Committee is still moving forward with the promotion of a bill to add another retired teacher to the State Retirement and Pension Board. With the sudden resignation of Treasurer Dixon last month, business of the Board seems to be in a state of change at this time. Nancy Kopp, former Montgomery County Delegate, will assume the office of State Treasurer.

The United Seniors of Maryland, of which MRTA is a component, met with our delegates in Annapolis on January 30, 2002. Topping their legislative priority list this year are prescription drug costs, transportation for senior citizens, Medicare waivers, long term care, and health insurance for all Marylanders.

The AARP Legislative Committee, which includes several MRTA members, meets monthly in Annapolis to lobby our MD representatives about health care, insurance, and prescription drug costs also.

It is important that we stay alert to all that is going on with our legislature in Annapolis and Washington. We must remind our legislators that we are partners in getting legislation passed. We are the voices that promote and press for change to benefit all seniors in Maryland.

In lieu of the tour, you may choose to observe some of the committee hearings in progress, look around the State House on your own, or wander down some of the cobble stone streets of our state capitol (a street map will be provided). We will depart for home at 2:15 pm.
