LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

Unfortunately, although the retire/rehire legislation (sponsored by Senator Leo Green) passed both the House and Senate in the 2004 legislative session, a Conference Committee appointed to resolve differences in the House and Senate amendments, did not concur. Despite our best efforts to extend the program, it failed. (I spoke on behalf of PGCRTA and MRTA at the Hearing in favor of extending the retire/rehire legislation. As did PGCEA President Carol Kilby, and MSTA President, Pat Forester.)

Delegate Anthony Brown, of Prince George's County's District 25, was recently named by House Speaker Michael Busch, to be the 2005 House Majority Whip. During the summer, Delegate Brown's National Guard Unit was called to duty (stateside); however, he has been assured that his job will still remain for him when he returns to Annapolis.

Delegate James Procter, of Prince George's County's District 27, was appointed in June, to serve on a University System of Maryland Task Force to Study financial aid policies-specifically, to make education more affordable for MD's neediest students.

Carl Lancaster, who serves as our representative on the on the Maryland's Retirement and Pension System

Board, was named Investment Chairman in June. (This continues to be a voluntary/non-paying position.) If you attended the MRTA Convention in Ocean City, you heard Former Governor Schafer praising Carl for his diligent work on the Board.

I had the privilege of being the MRTA representative to the National Retired Teachers Association Legislative Convention in Washington in June. Several speakers echoed our concerns about social security, Medicare, and teacher retirement benefits. Our directors continue to watch these issues in Congress and speak up on our behalf. You are encouraged to do the same by calling the offices of your legislators in the House or Senate.

*About 70% of all Seniors vote. Plan to be one of them on November 2!



HANDLING STRESS

At times stress is motivating, like when it helps you win a competition or meet a deadline. But most of the time we think of stress as a negative or uncomfortable feeling.

How do you respond to stressful situations depends on several things, including your:

View of the stressful situation. How bad is this? Can you get through it?

General outlook in life. Do you tend to be more positive or negative?

General health and well-being. Are you well-rested or sleep-deprived?

Do you have a healthy diet or live on junk food? Do you get enough exercise or is there never enough time to fit it in? Are you healthy overall or do you have chronic health problems?

Stress can affect your health. Any stress that keeps occurring can lead to getting sick more often. You may have problems sleeping, concentrating and eating. It can cause high blood pressure, heart disease, anxiety and depression.

Make a list. Think of all the things that cause you the most stress.

Take control. Decide which things on your list you can do something about.

Unload and learn to say "no". If there are things that you just can't or don't want to do, let them go—cross them off your list. Don't commit to new things just because you feel you have to.

Learning to say "no" might take some practice. It might feel uncomfortable at first. But taking on too much and failing is more stressful than "passing" on a request in the first place.

Practice setting limits. The key to setting limits is to first set priorities. Decide what is most important to you.

Learning to manage stress in your life can help you live healthier and happier.
